Hearing the voices of sex workers-support to be heard

Sex workers need to be resourced to participate in consultation process:

- 1. Support needs to be provided to facilitate sex worker participation:
- 1 a. Organisations of sex workers/peers need to be funded and properly resourced with training, expertise, and access to professional development
- 2a. Barriers to sex worker participation should be minimised-

protection of individual privacy, fears for safety/prosecution, amnesty during and following process, fear of stigma and discrimination loss of their job, fear of retribution from co-workers

2. Skills need to be developed Community consultation skills –

- -meeting skills,
- -decision making skills- (debating, voting, consensus models, recommendation models, etc)
- -self-documentation through research for and by the community, -documentary video/book writing, media releases controlled by sex workers

Communication skills: written, public speaking, working with media, networking, liaising authorities or government

- 3. Rights and responsibilities need to be clearly set out
- 4. Education on the existing legislation, and regulatory system needs to be provided to <u>all</u> participants, sex workers, brothel owners, clients, communities, authorities
- 5. Sex workers should be clearly placed at the centre of the debate/consultation as they are trult the expert witnesses to the impact of public policy on prostitution
- 6. International declarations of rights should become the guiding principle to which consultative processes aspire: without a greater goal, there is no motivation when difficulties arise.
